THE RULES OF HOCKEY

THESE NOTES have been written for those spectators who are not very familiar with the Rules of Hockey. It is hoped that the explanations will help them to understand and enjoy the games.

There are many differences between Hockey and Soccer Rules. The "off-side" rule in Hockey is like the old Soccer rule, requiring three defenders between the attacker and the goal when the ball is passed to him—not when he receives it.

The intentional use of any part of the body (except the hand) to stop the ball is forbidden nor may the ball be kicked or propelled in any way except with the stick.

The body may not be interposed between the ball and an opponent as an obstruction, even unintentionally, nor may a player tackle from the left of an opponent, unless he touch the ball, before the stick or person of the opponent.

No form of charging is permitted. The goalkeepers may stop the ball with their bodies and they may also kick the ball, but only inside the circles drawn in front of their own goals. These circles are peculiar to Hockey and it is only possible to score a goal if a ball be hit by an attacker inside the circle.

The "corner" rule is very similar to Soccer, but it has special points; for example, the ball must always be stopped before a shot is made at goal from a corner hit.

There are two umpires but no linesmen, and each controls one half of the ground except under certain circumstances.

Hockey umpires always try to avoid blowing their whistles by applying the "advantage" rule as much as possible. No appealing is allowed, and it is customary for the players to play in silence (but that does not apply to the spectators !)

The Aim and Work of the Hockey Association

THE HOCKEY ASSOCIATION is the Governing Body for men's Hockey in England and its chief aim is to ensure that the amateur status of the game is maintained. Affiliated to it are five Divisional Associations (North, South, East, West and Midlands) and the Combined Services Hockey Association. The Counties are affiliated to the five Divisional Associations and, in turn, each Club is affiliated to its County Association. The three Services are represented by the Combined Services Hockey Association. The Council consists of a President and Vice-Presidents elected for past services to hockey, and three representatives from each Divisional Association together with the officers and the Hon. Secretary of the International Hockey Board.

The rules were originally made by the Hockey Association. In 1900 the International Hockey Board was brought into being by the home countries for this purpose and in 1948 the Federation Internationale de Hockey joined the Board, so that now, wherever hockey is played by men throughout the world it is played under one code of Rules.

The Hockey Association has formed a team of experts, known as "The Travelling Circus," which has visited Clubs and Schools during the past three years lecturing on the game and the rules, and last season the demand for their services was greater than ever before. In October last a course for players was held at Bisham Abbey in conjunction with the Central Council of Physical Recreation and it is hoped next October to arrange a course for coaches. The Association is anxious to see this work spread to all its Divisions and Counties, who are asked to send prospective coaches to this Course.

The Association, whenever practicable, is prepared to send teams to play schools, and on the occasion of their jubilee Hockey Association XIs will be got together to play clubs. Next season it is hoped to arrange fixtures with Oxford and Cambridge Universities.

The Council fully recognise the value of these activities in keeping up and gradually improving the general standard of play throughout the country, particularly at a time when young men on leaving school have to undertake some form of national service.
